

Discover your coast

It is 280 million years old, home to world famous geological formations, rarely seen flora and fauna and stunning cliff top views.

Its seven kilometres feature rugged cliffs, small coves and the Tjilbruke Dreaming Track, providing a unique experience of Kaurna culture.

Graced with a scenic walking trail overlooking the sea, Marion's coast extends from Marino in the north to Hallett Headland Reserve in the south and with summer upon us it is waiting to be explored.

In a bid to discover the secrets of this remarkable area more than 350 people descended on Hallett Cove foreshore, transforming it into giant classroom as part of a special community event.

The Coastal Funshop at Heron Way Reserve saw families delve into rock pools, learn about local wildlife and create a beach sculpture.

It also featured a guided Kaurna heritage and geology walk through Hallett Cove Conservation Park, a photography competition and activities for kids.

The October event was the third in a series of workshops themed *Treasuring our Coast* which aimed to increase awareness of Marion's coastline and identify ways of preserving and enhancing it for future generations.

Tania Macdonald's family was one of many that got involved.

"The ocean breeze and sunshine reset the system and we were left wanting more."
Ms Macdonald said.

"I love Hallett Cove and it's hard to find activities for small children so it was really nice to spend the day there.

"The kids really loved storytelling in the inflatable leafy sea dragon and exploring rock pools."

Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis said the workshops, which attracted more than 450 participants, helped council connect with the community while providing a deeper understanding of the coastal region.

"The community has shown they are passionate about the coast and the workshops have drawn support for actions that preserve and improve it, care for marine life and promote revegetation," Ms Lewis said.

"People value the coast for its geology, ecology and open space, which makes it an ideal place to relax, learn and enjoy exercise.

"The Coastal Funshop combined entertainment and education, and explanations of Kaurna history from Karl Telfer and descriptions of how the landscape was formed by the University of Adelaide's Associate Professor Vic Gostin were fascinating."

Local environmental groups including the Friends of Hallett Cove Conservation Park, the Friends of Marino Conservation Park, the Friends of Lower Field River and Bush for Life were joined by Reefwatch and Dr Philip Roetman, Research Fellow at the University of South Australia's Barbara Hardy institute, in providing specialist information about the significance of the area.

Dr Roetman, who was part of a live radio broadcast from the site, said:

"It's invigorating to be immersed in such a stunning natural environment."

"With beaches, parks, great scenery and walking trails, residents are lucky to have such a diverse range of places to visit."

Secretary of the Friends of Hallett Cove Conservation Park Penny Rendle said the event was an ideal way to speak directly to families about the 51-hectare park which is a refuge for native plants and wildlife.

"The area is a haven for wildlife, particularly birds that work their way down the Field River, including the heron, ibis and finch," Ms Rendle said.

"It also represents the only chance people have to see original coastal vegetation."

Dr Roetman is working on a citizen science program in collaboration with the City of Marion to help people connect to the natural world. You can learn more and register to be involved online at unisa.edu.au/citizenscience

Developing the foreshore

Heron Way Reserve is the focal point of a plan to create a spectacular coastal recreation space with a modern play area, amphitheatre and adventure trail while introducing water and environmental management initiatives.

The Hallett Cove Beach Foreshore Master Plan covers an area of 2.7 hectares and was created following 18 months of community consultation, including workshops and surveys.

The site is adjacent to Hallett Cove Conservation Park and is a picturesque section of coastline and includes about 500m of Coast Park (the Adelaide metropolitan coastal walking trail).

The master plan design reflects the natural qualities of the landscape and references astronomy, the connection between day and night and land and sky and Kaurna culture.

Council would like to thank the community for their enthusiasm and input into the plan and is exploring funding opportunities.

School students are going to war on waste thanks to a new environmental education program launched by the City of Marion.

Waste Warriors teaches children to identify and safely clean up littering hot spots at their school and in their neighbourhood.

The program provides practical tips on recycling, putting waste in the correct bin and litter prevention.

Waste Warriors was successfully piloted at Woodend Primary School in Sheidow Park earlier in the year and saw 12 students participate in classroom activities before putting their learning to the test in the school's grounds.

Woodend Primary School teacher Lynda Palmer said students had enjoyed learning about waste prevention and the program built on the school's work recycling 10c containers.

"The kids have learnt a lot about litter prevention and why it's important to put rubbish in the correct bin," Ms Palmer said.

"They have had fun working together tidying up some parts of the school and share what they learn with the school community and at home."

Students are supervised by adults at all times and taught to use safety gloves and tongs when collecting litter.

Land deal to create more open space

Marion Council has bought a large tract of State Government land in South Plympton to create more open space in the city's north.

The 6000sq m of former Housing SA land, the equivalent of six homes, is sandwiched between Jervois Street and Waterhouse Road.

Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis said the purchase was an exciting opportunity to overcome a shortage of open space in the area.

"Our Open Space Strategy has long identified a need for more land for the community to enjoy in the north of the city," Ms Lewis said.

"The purchase of the former Housing SA land is a rare opportunity to create open space at a time when most available land is turned into high density housing."

Ms Lewis said a report will be prepared for council outlining how the community will be involved in deciding how they want the land to be used.

"We will be asking the community how they wish the land to be developed so we can consider this in future council budgets," Ms Lewis said.

The purchase price of the land is \$2.76 million with council contributing \$1.56 million out of its Open Space Reserve Fund, an account set up to develop open space facilities.

The Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure is contributing the balance through its Planning and Development Open Space Grant Funding Program.

The funding enabled City of Marion to buy the land for the community to enjoy.

Home library service expands

Aged, frail and mobility impaired residents will benefit from an expansion of Marion Council's home library service.

From January next year, the service will cover the whole of the city.

A dedicated van is being purchased and volunteers recruited to deliver books, DVDs and magazines directly to residents at home and in aged care facilities.

As part of the improvements, council will decommission its ageing and oversized mobile library service vehicle, which covers only the northern and central parts of Marion on a schedule of designated stops.

Manager libraries and cultural development Abby Dickson said the improvement followed extensive consultation with users.

"The improved service will reach more residents who physically are unable to access their local library and help older people to remain independent in their homes," Ms Dickson said.

"The mobile library truck is too big to easily access newer suburbs and has stairs, making it difficult for customers who are mobility impaired.

"The new service will also help us cater for an increase in demand brought about by an ageing population."

Council is investing \$55,000 in a new, smaller van and expanding the service to include the city's southern suburbs.

Letters have been sent to library users outlining the changes and explaining how they can access the new service.

Talking signs give voice to history

The history of the Sturt River has been brought to life with new state-of-the-art signs featuring voice recordings, specially commissioned indigenous artworks and rare historical photographs.

Stories from the community were recorded to create interactive soundscapes at six sites along a 3km stretch of the Sturt Linear Park walking and cycling trail from Warriparinga to Oaklands Reserve.

The signs feature archive images dating back to 1854, photographs, artworks and stories of how people lived and worked along the river.

The Sturt River – Many Voices interpretive signage project was developed over 15 months to preserve the area's rich history and provide a dynamic education and tourism tool, City of Marion cultural heritage officer Anita McDonald said.

"The community shared their stories and old photographs with us to create an historical experience for residents, school students and tourists," Ms McDonald said.

"The audio recordings blend voices and atmospheric sounds, including the didgeridoo, Kaurna language, old cars, kookaburras, children playing and the river.

"Each of the six signs contains a themed audio episode which can be understood in any order while journeying along the trail."

Sound is activated by an infra-red sensor when people approach the signs.

The audio and sensor are solar powered and recordings are stored on updateable micro SD cards.

The stories and soundscapes were digitally recorded by composer and new media artist Dr Luke Harrald from the University of Adelaide with technical and artistic provided by James Coulter from River Strategic Design.

One of the many people to contribute to the recordings was local resident Arthur Beales who led a team which designed the South Western Suburbs Drainage Scheme to alleviate flooding in the region, including Marion, Brighton and Mitcham.

Completed in 1971, the scheme saw part of Sturt River converted into a high capacity drain.

"Sharing the story was fun and challenging, especially compressing a lot of information into a short time span," Mr Beales, 82, said.

"The signage project helps people understand how we got to where we are today."

Sturt River – Many Voices cost \$53,000 with \$22,500 provided by the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities, \$16,000 in kind contribution and \$1000 funding from the City of Marion with the balance made up from other external sources.

'Architects are being engaged to prepare concepts and cost estimates for the Hallett Cove branch library, office and human services centre in Ramrod Avenue. This will bring us closer to the construction of our own library.'

'Council has decided as the projected cost of our library has escalated to \$2 million it will be necessary to defer construction until 1991/92. In the interim, a shop front library will be established on Zwerner Drive for an anticipated cost this financial year of about \$100,000.' The early residents of southern Marion had the vision and our journey has taken 27 years. When I was elected to council in 1997, supported by the Hallett Cove Progress Association and my community, my goal was to continue the journey. I didn't think it would take so long.

As a councillor for southern Marion I have worked with many passionate community members, councillors over five terms, supportive staff, and Members of Parliament to build Cove Civic Centre for the people of the south.

I would like to acknowledge the early work of our residents' associations. I am also saddened that some of those who worked beside me are no longer here to see their hard work come to fruition.

I know that many of today's residents in southern Marion will thank them for ensuring their wonderful legacy will be enjoyed by present and future generations.

SA firm builds Cove Civic Centre

A South Australian builder has won the contract to construct the \$13.4 million library, community and enterprise centre at Hallett Cove.

Construction began in late October after Marion Council awarded the tender to the Mossop Group, based at Hindmarsh.

The builder's appointment coincides with council selecting the name Cove Civic Centre for the facility from among a raft of suggestions from the community.

Marion Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis said the decisions were a major step forward in realising a more than 20-year dream to construct the complex in the southern suburbs.

"Mossop Group has 30 years' experience in building some of most recognisable structures in South Australia," Ms Lewis said.

"The Cove Civic Centre will soon be added to their list of achievements and we're looking forward to working with them. We expect construction will start this month and be completed late next year."

Ms Lewis said council selected the name of the new centre from 21 entries in a community competition, which included a mix of historical and indigenous names. "The Cove Civic Centre reflects the fact that the facility is more than a library, community and enterprise centre but will be our heart in southern Marion," Ms Lewis said.

"Its name will soon be as familiar as so many of our local facilities."

Mrs Lesley Taylor, who has lived at Hallett Cove for the past 27 years, submitted the winning entry – receiving her inspiration from the name of the Canberra CBD: Civic.

"It's extremely exciting to think that each time I'll go past the Cove Civic Centre I know I'll have named it," Mrs Taylor said.

"This is a wonderful honour and I'm looking forward to using the library and all it has to offer."

In addition to naming the facility, Mrs Taylor will also be invited to the opening ceremony and, together with the Mayor, will be the first to officially enter the new building.

When completed in late 2014, the Cove Civic Centre – which will be the jewel of the southern suburbs – will feature:

- Access to 35,000 books, e-books, magazines, CDs and DVDs.
- A community hall for up to 280 people and meeting rooms.
- A computer training suite with wi-fi and broadband.
- Meeting facilities and resources for local businesses.
- > A children's toy library.
- > A plaza that incorporates public art.

About 130,000 people a year are expected to use the Cove Civic Centre, which will be open seven days a week.

Along with serving a growing community in the southern suburbs, the centre will provide 8000 small businesses with access to quality information and facilities to enable them to compete more effectively and drive jobs growth.

The existing Hallett Cove library will remain open while its replacement is being built. Council is looking at options for the future of the old library.

Council has contributed \$10 million towards the construction of the Cove Civic Centre with \$3.4 million provided by the Federal Government.

Secrets of \$9 million wetland revealed

School students and community groups are discovering the secrets of the \$9 million Oaklands wetland thanks to a newly launched series of guided tours.

Visitors can learn about the inner workings of a wetland, including its pumping infrastructure, electrical control equipment and the aquifer injection and extraction process.

The tours also explain how water flows slowly through aquatic plants that remove nutrients and sediment after which treated water is stored in underground reservoirs (aquifers) reaching almost 100m below ground.

Treated stormwater will then be used to irrigate about 30 council reserves.

City of Marion water resources coordinator Glynn Ricketts, who conducts the tours, said visitors had a unique opportunity to experience the wetland before it was fully operational.

"Oaklands wetland is developing rapidly and the tours allow people to appreciate the extent and complexity of its infrastructure," Mr Ricketts said.

"It is already proving to be an important site for environmental education.

"We recently hosted Year 11 students from Westminster School who were gathering information for a competition to design a logo and poster to illustrate how stormwater will be used to irrigate reserves."

The wetland is also being used for scientific research by Flinders University.

Oaklands wetland is expected to be fully operational in 2015.

The wetland cost more than \$9 million, with the City of Marion and the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges Management Board each contributing \$2.66 million. The Federal Government provided \$3.73 million through the *Water for the Future* initiative.

- > A commitment to the use of low-carbon and climate-resilient systems and materials
- A high quality built environment which is efficient, vibrant and supportive of Tonsley mixed use nature
- Open spaces incorporating walking and cycling paths that promote health and wellbeing through physical recreation and outdoor living;
- > Vegetation that will be chosen to support the site's sustainability targets.
- > Storm water and recycled water use and energy-efficient buildings.

Council has allocated a total of over \$7 million to upgrade 89 playgrounds/parks between 2008 and 2023 and, based on feedback received, it appears that this will be inadequate to complete all these upgrades to the standard our community expects. The council's plan to upgrade the Domain Plaza has potential costs in the order of \$6.7 - \$7.1 million. I don't see the Domain Plaza as enough of a priority to pursue such an expensive plan; Council could use the savings made from leasing the Marion Cultural Centre café to make more modest improvements. Such a large sum of ratepayers' money is better spent improving our parks, footpaths, drains and roads; if indeed it should be spent at all.

Our Community Safety Inspectors carry out very important tasks indeed, be it to enforce legislated regulations or our local By-Laws. They have a critical regulatory and education function in our city. But I need to ask the constituency if you think they are visible enough? Are their uniforms and vehicles easily recognised so as to note your rates at work as they frequent your streets, reserves and car parks? Unlike surrounding cities our inspectors wear a very nondescript uniform and drive equally nondescript, almost unmarked vehicles. For example, if you were to shop at Westfield Marion, would you like to easily identify our roving inspector to seek his/her advice about parking arrangements or even about your dog registration? Please let me know.

Very soon we will have train services running again on the Adelaide to Seaford line and at its peak every seven minutes a train will pass through the Oaklands Crossing, closing the railway gates and stopping vehicular traffic. Can you imagine the traffic disruption that awaits us all as we attempt to negotiate this bifurcation of two major roads at this busy rail crossing? Thus far, council has been unsuccessful attracting the attention of government to fund a grade separation crossing. You and your neighbours

We all know life is a lot easier when we get on well with our neighbours. For a variety of reasons relationships with those next can become strained, sometimes around planning and development issues, which is when people often call their council for advice.

This article clarifies what council can do to help – but remember, there's no substitute for good communication with your neighbours.

Fencing and boundary issues are often civil matters and regulated under common law. A council's power under the Development Act 1993 does not normally allow them to become involved in civil matters, which are generally referred to the Legal Services Commission of South Australia.

The best way to resolve a dispute between property owners is by parties working together or seeking mediation.

A council may inspect a site when an enquiry or complaint is received to ensure no unauthorised building work has been undertaken, or to check there is no unauthorised land use and there are no safety concerns.

If a council considers the development is legal and safe and the complainant is still aggrieved they will be referred to the Legal Services Commission – or they may seek independent legal advice.

The following guidelines highlight the obligations property owners have to their neighbours:

- > You must ensure that storm water does not enter adjoining properties from your property, whether from gutters, downpipes or surface
- You must not alter/remove/replace the boundary fence without the consent of your neighbour
- You must not build up soil against the boundary fence
- You must not excavate deeper than 600mm at the property boundary without first notifying your neighbour
- If you alter the level of your land you must generally ensure the change in level is held by a retaining wall or similar
- You should not allow any structures on your property to encroach on or over your neighbour's property
- If you and your neighbour have a shared common wall between your houses it may well be a required fire wall. You must both ensure the wall is maintained in good condition all the way up to the underside of the roof cladding

- If your neighbour has a wall on the property boundary you are responsible for ensuring that:
 - > Soil is not built up against the wall
 - The wall can be easily inspected for termites
- You do not fix anything to the wall or alter the wall in any way without the consent of your neighbour

Following these guidelines is an important step in staying on good terms with your neighbour.

Food rescue charity to feed south

More than 180,000 meals a year will be served to people in need after food rescue charity *OzHarvest* announced it will be increasing its services in Adelaide's inner southern suburbs.

Cities of Marion and Holdfast Bay used Anti-Poverty Day in October to announce they have teamed up with *OzHarvest* to expand the reach of the service in the region.

OzHarvest founder and CEO Ronni Kahn, Marion Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis, SACOSS CEO Ross Womersley and celebrity chef Adam Swanson celebrated the partnership in front of more than 100 people at the Marion Cultural Centre.

OzHarvest SA state manager Hayley Everuss said the expansion was the next step in helping the community and saving good food from landfill in Adelaide's south.

"It's extremely exciting that the City of Marion with support from the City of Holdfast Bay has provided us with an opportunity to introduce our food rescue program to about 200 food businesses in the inner south," Ms Everuss said.

"I expect we'll save at least 50 tonnes of food in this region throughout the next year which will be used to make 180,000 meals for charitable agencies in southern Adelaide."

Founded in 2004, *OzHarvest* is a national, non-denominational charity that rescues excess food from landfill and redistributes it to other charities supporting vulnerable people.

The charity currently rescues quality food from 300 Adelaide food businesses and redistributes it to 50 charities in suburbs from the CBD to Gawler – providing meals for 60,000 people a month.

Marion Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis said: "I want to welcome *OzHarvest* to the region and the important work it does to help reduce hunger and limit waste to landfill."

"Council will use its contacts to help connect *OzHarvest* to the local food industry and community agencies."

Healthy Communities Initiative has collaborated to support *OzHarvest* in the south and facilitate linking business and community agencies. This initiative is funded by the Australian Government.

Water plan to protect reserves

Marion Council is working to secure the future quality of parks and reserves by improving the way it waters its open spaces.

Water will continue to flow at reserves designed for sport and recreation, while low maintenance landscaping will improve the appearance of open space that does not warrant irrigation.

The changes are part of a comprehensive plan to improve the quality of reserves while balancing the rising cost of water.

Mayor Felicity-ann Lewis said the draft Irrigation Management Plan had been specially developed to improve the quality of open space by more efficient watering.

"The draft Irrigation Management Plan aims to ensure the community gets maximum benefit from open space by making it 'fit for purpose' - whether that is as a cricket oval, athletic field or picnic area," Ms Lewis said.

"The plan uses scientific data to ensure Marion's parks and reserves get the maximum benefit from available water.

"It is a wide-ranging document that will guide for staff in setting irrigation schedules, turf management, and landscape design."

After water restrictions were introduced in South Australia in 2007 the number of reserves irrigated in Marion fell from 144 to 26.

That has now risen to 71 with the number set to rise even further when Oaklands wetland is fully operational

The draft Irrigation Management Plan embeds Water Sensitive Urban Design principles to protect and conserve the water cycle, complies with SA Water regulations, and encourages the use of alternatives to mains water.

Ms Lewis said the plan also formed part of council's response to the drought and changes in rainfall patterns.

"The plan continues our response to the drought and ensures reserves benefit from stormwater reuse through the new \$9 million Oaklands wetland," she said.

The draft Irrigation Management Plan was available for comment on council's website in October.





Hard yards made easy

A volunteer gardening group is cutting overgrown yards down to size and putting a smile on the face of the community.

Hard Yards is a group of 20 volunteers determined to weed, cut grass and trim trees to make backyards manageable for people who cannot do the work themselves through ill health, age or a disability.

Formed in May last year by Josh Smith from local church members, *Hard Yards* has so far blitzed 15 backyards from O'Halloran Hill to Marion.

Using their own mowers, whipper snippers, chainsaws, rakes and wheelbarrows, the group responds to cries for help from the community Josh said.

"We love to take on big projects where we can help people who are older, have a disability, or are unwell and cannot cope with their garden," Josh, 29, said.

"It's wonderful to see the looks on people's faces when we transform their garden, often within three or four hours, so it's neat and tidy and easy to care for.

"The work is free and the smiles people give us is more than enough reward."

The idea to start the group came to Josh when he suggested to Stephanie, who he married this October, that they should do something to help people.

Stephanie's response, "Yes, why don't you?" was all the motivation he needed.

Despite being in the final stages of studying for a Phd in medical science and delivering pizzas to earn a living, Josh decided to make time to help others by tidying up their gardens so they were safe and could be enjoyed.

A member of the C3 Church Marion, he contacted other local churches looking for more volunteers and was soon joined by Marion Christian Church.

He also met City of Marion's volunteer development officer who provided advice on how the group could improve its operations.

"I was overwhelmed by the enthusiasm for the project and many people brought energy, ideas and a willingness to work so we were soon up and running," Josh said.

"Although I'm not a gardener, I grew up on a 60-acre property so know the basics of what's needed to keep a garden tidy.

BACKYARD HEROES

Hard Yards volunteers Tom Edwards, Chris Williams and Josh Smith are helping people tidy up their backyards.

"There have been some unusual projects, like spending two days cutting up a huge pile of wooden beams that someone dumped in a man's yard."

News of *Hard Yards* is spreading fast and the group is seeking to swell its ranks from churches and the wider community as it tackles new projects, including work at Abbeyfield House in Edwardstown which provides accommodation for adults with an intellectual disability.

Josh said volunteering brings many rewards.

"It's very satisfying to know you've made someone's life a bit easier – one lady cried she was so grateful for the work we did," he said.

"Our youngest volunteer is aged eight and the oldest 74, and everyone gets a buzz out of helping people."

Josh was presented with a *Premier's Certificate of Recognition for Outstanding Volunteering Service* earlier this year.
