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Photograph your changing world

The community is invited to record the changing world by photographing the local environment at specially installed posts and sharing the images on a website.

The Fluker Post project involves people in caring for their environment by monitoring change at wetlands, parks, creeks and coastal areas.

Three posts have been installed in the City of Marion – two at Oaklands Wetland and one outside the Boatshed Café overlooking the beach at Hallett Cove.

The posts include a cradle from where people take photographs with cameras or smartphones and instructions explaining how to submit the images which will be displayed in chronological order on a website.

Ruby Kempson from Ascot Park took some snaps with her smartphone from the post at Oaklands Wetland.

"It's a really good idea to get locals involved in what's happening in their city... I'll be back to take some more photos," Ruby, 17, said.

The concept was developed by Dr Martin Fluker at Victoria University in Melbourne who has posts around Victoria and one underwater on the Great Barrier Reef.

The project is a partnership between the City of Marion and UniSA's Discovery Circle which involves the community in research. More information is online at discoverycircle.org.au/projects/flukerposts

Communities call for Darlington rethink

Marion and Mitcham Councils have held an historic joint sitting to urge the State Government to rethink the design of the \$620 million Darlington road upgrade.

In front of more than 100 residents, the two Councils met at Mitcham Chambers on November 9 to voice their concerns about the existing plan for the 2.3km section of Main South Rd, linking Ayliffes Rd at St Marys with the Southern Expressway.

Both Councils support an upgrade at Darlington but insist the design needs to:

- > Allow for the future expansion at Flinders University, Flinders Medical Centre and Tonsley, as well as drive jobs growth in the southern region.
- Maximise employment opportunities for local businesses and residents.
- > Improve local traffic access to the area, which has worried residents and Councils.
- > Promote cycling and public transport, overcome car parking shortages, and improve access from one side of Main South Road to the other.
- > Minimise the loss of trees during construction.

The Councils were briefed on an alternative design commissioned by Flinders University which improves access, stimulates jobs and drives economic growth.

The State Government is expected to announce a final design for the construction in either late November or early December.

Marion Mayor Kris Hanna said he was pleased the State Government was listening to the Councils over their concerns for greater east-west connectivity.

"The State Government has indicated additional road connections between our two communities are being factored into the design but we need to be consulted on the final concept before it is released," Mr Hanna said.

Mr Hanna said the Councils hoped to work with the State Government to improve the final Darlington design.

"Our Councils want to work with the State Government to develop a design for Darlington that solves our concerns and delivers infrastructure that is more than just a road," Mr Hanna said.

"We want a design that creates jobs, builds the economy and connects our communities.

"Treating Tonsley, Flinders University, Flinders Medical Centre, Science Park and the surrounding areas as one precinct offers great opportunities to generate a substantial increase in employment."

Wetland water to flow at bowls clubs



Water bills will be cut at two local bowls clubs thanks to stormwater treated at Oaklands Wetland.

Ascot Park and Marion bowling clubs are set to be connected to the wetland's distribution network in time to irrigate the greens during the summer season.

The Ascot Park club is expected to save about 20 per cent on its \$15,000 annual water bill, while it's estimated Marion will shave a similar amount off its annual bill of \$10,000.

Treasurer of Ascot Park Bowling Club Graham Warren said he was delighted the

"We're excited to be connected to the Oaklands Wetland network which will help us keep the greens healthy and save money," Mr Warren said.

"It's especially good news coming into summer when we traditionally use more water."

An estimated 50 megalitres of stormwater treated at Oaklands Wetland will be fed through a network of pipes to irrigate Council reserves and parks this summer.

The two bowling clubs will bring the total number of sites irrigated via the wetland to seven, with that figure expected to rise to 31 over the coming years.

Stunts galore as skate park opens at \$1m plaza

Skateboarders, BMX and scooter riders are celebrating the unveiling of a new skate park as the showpiece of the \$1 million Oaklands Recreation Plaza.

Mayor Kris Hanna and Member for Elder Annabel Digance cut the ribbon to officially open the plaza and signal the start of a display of daredevil stunts by skateboarders and riders in front of more than 250 people at a community event in October.

The plaza includes a parkour exercise circuit, mini basketball court, lawns, lighting, a shelter, toilet and picnic areas.

The multi-use facility is the first of its kind in the City of Marion and contains only the second skate park to be built in the city.

Mr Hanna said the site would be a drawcard for skaters and the broader community.

"The skate park takes pride of place at the new Oaklands Recreation Plaza which includes facilities for the broader community," Mr Hanna said.

"People can try out the mini basketball court, have fun exercising on the parkour circuit and picnic on lawns."

Council is continuing to work with users of the skate park and the local community to ensure Oaklands Recreation Plaza can be enjoyed by everyone.

The October 10 opening featured a round of the YMCA Stake Park Leagues which drew more than 50 competitive skaters and riders aged from 12 to adult from throughout Adelaide.

Speaking at the event on behalf of the State Government, which funded the project with the City of Marion, Member for Elder Annabel Digance said the plaza was a result of a shared vision.

"Seeing this project come to life is evidence of the importance of the shared vision and collaborative relationship between Local Government, State Government and the community," she said.

The plaza is at Oaklands Wetland and Reserve, Oaklands Rd, Oaklands Park.

BMX rider Shaun Lake from Plympton Park was one of the first to try out the slopes of the

"The skate park is well designed so you can pump around without having to stop," Shaun, 15 said.

"It's exciting having the park close to home as I used to have to travel into the city."

Community consultation identified a need for a skate park to serve residents in the centre and north of the city. The City of Marion's only other skate park is in Hallett Cove.

Construction began in October last year and was undertaken by South Australian company M & B Civil Engineering.

The plaza adds to the facilities at the 6.6 hectare Oaklands Wetland and Reserve.

Oaklands Recreation Plaza has been funded by \$900,000 in grants from the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure's Planning and Development and Local Government Stimulus funding programs and \$100,000 from the City of Marion.

Lowest rate rise in more than 10 years delivers value for ratepayers

A \$195 million building boom and a commitment to delivering the lowest rate rise in more than 10 years are among a raft of Marion Council's achievements in 2014/15.

Council's recently released annual report provides an insight into how the city has developed over the past financial year and details the progress of major projects and services.

The report shows work began on a \$1 million revamp of Cove Sports and Community Club, a new memorial was unveiled at Hallett Cove in time for ANZAC Centenary commemorations and plans were finalised to build a new park worth \$940,000 in South Plympton.

Additionally, a new 70-metre water slide was opened at the Marion Outdoor Swimming Centre, Council secured \$100,000 of State Government funding towards a new dog park in Trott Park and upgrading sporting infrastructure has been prioritised.

Mayor Kris Hanna said Council had quickly made its mark following last November's Local Government elections.

"Eight of the 13 'new' Councillors elected a year ago have not been on the previous Council. As a united group we've brought a fresh approach to the City of Marion," Mr Hanna said.

"We immediately began working on the budget to deliver better value for ratepayers and our pressure resulted in more than \$2.6 million in savings by increasing efficiencies.

"This enabled us to announce an average household rate rise of 2.9 percent for 2015/16, the lowest in more than 10 years. This has been achieved without reducing services."

The report shows \$195.5 million of building applications were granted, an increase of more than \$27 million on the previous year and the highest in eight years.

The biggest approval was for Westminster School's \$25 million early learning and primary education facility in Marion.

Work also began on a \$1.5 million upgrade of Railway Terrace in Ascot Park.


The report reveals that:

- > 44,180 volunteer hours were contributed
- > 851,830 library items were loaned
- > 1751 Development Applications were granted
- 4.420 trips were made by the Community Bus

Details of how Council allocated its \$72 million budget are featured in an overview of its financial performance which shows more than \$41 million was invested in public infrastructure and \$6 million in health and community care.

The centre includes an eight-lane 50-metre pool and shaded learner and toddler pools.

There is a kiosk, barbecue facilities, a playground and a lift to help people with a disability access the main pool.

Unit manager cultural facilities, David Barrett, said the centre was the perfect place for families to enjoy fun and fitness outdoors.

"The Marion Outdoor Swimming Centre is the ideal venue for families to have fun and be active both in and out of the water," Mr Barrett said.

"Kids really enjoy the water slide, playing on the grass and then cooling off in the pools.

"You can pack a picnic and come for the day or keep fit by swimming laps or joining our aquarobics classes."

More than 18,000 thrill seekers have been propelled along the water slide's sweeping twists and turns since it opened last November.

An 18-metre inflatable obstacle course with Tarzan ropes and a slide will also be available during the school holidays as weather conditions permit.

Kokoda veteran's stories recorded for local history project

A 95-year-old veteran of World War Two has told his dramatic story of survival on the Kokoda Track in an on-camera interview to the City of Marion.

John Heard's recollections of the 1942 campaign against Japanese forces in Papua New Guinea has been recorded as part of a project to preserve first-hand accounts of historical events and honour the memories of local servicemen.

The former signalman and Sturt resident also described "going for an impromptu swim" after being on the cargo ship Costa Rica when it was sunk by German aircraft off the coast of Greece.

Mr Heard enlisted in the army in May 1940, aged 20, and was assigned to 1st Australian Corps Signals where he was promoted to Corporal.

After serving in the Greek and Syrian campaigns, in 1942 Mr Heard was in the midst of fighting on the 92-kilometre Kokoda track.

"We were on the Kokoda Track laying cables... the wires kept shorting due to the green sappy plants and we were on short rations of bully beef and a packet of biscuits shared by three men per day," he said.

"I ended up walking back to Port Moresby for medical treatment to prevent a cut becoming infected... hearing crunches in the undergrowth in front of me and finding the boot print of a Japanese soldier... we didn't have time to be scared."

Mr Heard's involvement in World War Two ended after being shipped back to Australia for treatment for fungal infections where he was daubed in coloured ointments, earning him the nickname of the 'Painted Man'.

After the war, Mr Heard became a Major in the regular army and worked as a lighthouse keeper and book keeper.

He and his wife Joanne recently celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary.

The recordings of Mr Heard and three other World War Two veterans will be available at the Marion Heritage Research Centre in early 2016.

The project is supported through a \$2700 grant from the Department of Veterans' Affairs Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grants Program.

The City of Marion is seeking additional grant funding to convert the raw footage into a documentary.

Community calls for Glenthorne transformation

Marion Council has backed calls from the local community to transform the 208ha Glenthorne Farm in O'Halloran Hill into a hub for tourism and recreation.

Renewed demands to unlock the potential of the state heritage-listed site were made earlier this year following the release of a report by the Friends of Glenthorne which outlined a vision to develop the property with sports fields, walking and cycling tracks and a precinct for festivals.

The report also includes ideas for revegetation, camp sites, a history trail, farmer's market and natural burial ground.

Mayor Kris Hanna said the site, which is owned by the University of Adelaide and is currently a sheep farm, had huge potential.

"Council will advocate for Glenthorne Farm to provide exciting recreational opportunities for the community while protecting the natural environment," Mr Hanna said.

"It's time to begin working to open up this this unique site so it can achieve its full potential."

At the General Council meeting of September 8, Marion Councillors voted unanimously to liaise with the University of Adelaide, the Friends of Glenthorne Farm and the State Government to promote use of the land for community benefit.

Glenthorne Farm is bordered by Majors Rd, Main South Rd and the Southern Expressway.

The state's first police commissioner, Major Thomas O'Halloran, settled the land in 1839, and it still contains the remains of buildings from the 1850s.

Friends' secretary Alan Burns welcomed Council's involvement.

"Revegetating Glenthorne could see it grow into a haven for native plants and wildlife, including rare birds," Mr Burns said.

"We've been striving for almost 20 years to increase community access to the land, so I'm delighted Council has become involved."

Residents, Councillors and government representatives developed a vision for the future of the site at a community workshop in May this year.

Former councillor remembered

More than 400 people attended the funeral of former City of Marion councillor Joahann Wolfgang Bierbaum who died in July after a short illness aged 69.

Mr Bierbaum served as an alderman of the City of Marion from 1995 to 1997 and as a councillor from 1991 to 1995 and 1997 to 2000.

Known to many as 'Wolfi', Mr Bierbaum was a long-time resident of Hallett Cove where he lived with his wife of 48 years.

Jane Bierbaum said her husband was passionate about his local community.

"Wolfi loved his family, community and work and had a social conscience," Mrs Bierbaum said.

"He worked to improve the area by helping found the Hallett Cove Progress Association almost 40 years ago. He was very proud of our five children, six grandchildren and two step grandchildren."

Mr Bierbaum started his career as a teacher before going on to work as an engineer at Port Stanvac and Birkenhead.

Mr Bierbaum's funeral was held at Centennial Park on July 10.

Abigail, Tabitha, Wesley and Paul Wambugu have adapted to life in Australia.

When Paul and Tabitha Wambugu migrated to Australia from Kenya in October 2012 they had no friends and were struggling to settle in their new country.

One year later they joined more than 50 new arrivals from countries as diverse as Afghanistan, India and Ireland at a Welcome to Australia event run by St Elizabeth's Church in Oaklands Park and found themselves playing backyard cricket, shooting hoops and striking up conversations with strangers.

For Mr Wambugu, who trained as a teacher before coming to Australia to build a better life for his family, this was a turning point.

"People made us feel part of the community and I suddenly felt like we weren't alone," Mr Wambugu said.

"Our children weren't with us at the time, so it was difficult to feel at home and make friends.

"Australia is a wonderful country and I'm now studying social work so I can put something back into the community."

Migrants and refugees are invited to the next Welcome to Australia event on Saturday, December 12 which starts at 5pm at the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre before moving on to St Elizabeth's Church and Dwyer Rd Reserve.

Activities are free and include swimming and come and try cricket, Australian Rules Football, soccer and a barbecue with Halal and vegetarian options.

Thousands flock to Cove Civic Centre



BUSY CHECK OUT

Cove Civic Centre has become the new destination for library lovers, businesses and community groups just months after opening to the public.

Latest figures show the \$13.4 million library, community and enterprise hub welcomed more than 46,000 visitors in the first three months following its official opening in August.

The modern library has proved a major drawcard with 57,342 items checked out, including 1466 e-books, and 770 new member registrations.

The business training suite and meeting rooms have received 186 bookings.

Sheidow Park resident Dave Gilbert said the centre had improved access to facilities for his family.

"My daughters Charley and Lilly are really into their reading so we visit the library at least once a fortnight and they check out a lot of e-books and printed books," Mr Gilbert said.

"I work as a business development manager and am looking into using the meeting rooms and training suite."

The Cove Civic Centre contains a library with 35,000 books, e-books, CDs, and DVDs, nine meeting rooms, a community hall for up to 200 people, high-speed wif-fi and an enterprise cente.

Using Ragamuffin Drive safely

The section of Ragamuffin Drive around the Cove Civic Centre is a shared space that can be used by cyclists, pedestrians and drivers.

This is the first shared space of its type in South Australia and is a concept that has been embraced in many other cities around the world.

The shared space begins at Ramrod Avenue and extends to the start of street parking in front of the Hallett Cove Lutheran Church.

Drivers and cyclists are advised to slow their speed and pedestrians need to be conscious of vehicles using the space.

MAJOR PROJECTS UPDATE



Tonsley continues its transformation

Tonsley, Australia's first innovation district, is transforming the former site of Mitsubishi Motors, attracting investment into the southern suburbs and drawing international recognition.

Tonsley has also come to life in recent months with new signage and wayfinding installed at key pedestrian locations and the opening of retail facilities.

Tonsley's educational institutes, businesses and community facilities are rapidly becoming a popular destination for people in Adelaide's southern suburbs.

Tonsley is being jointly developed by the Department of State Development and Renewal SA.

nbn announces connection schedule

The national broadband network (nbn) has announced that it has begun a three year roll out program to provide fast internet access to all homes and businesses in the City of Marion.

A government business, nbn, is upgrading Australia's phone and internet network.

Work has already begun in parts of Ascot Park, Park Holme, Clovelly Park, Marion, Mitchell Park and Bedford Park. Services are forecast to become available progressively from mid-2016 in these listed areas; and progressively across the City of Marion, as detailed in the table opposite.

The network is mandated to deliver wholesale speeds of at least 25 megabits per second download and five megabits per second upload by 2020 to every home and business in Australia.



Historic cottage opens for tours and scones

A group of local volunteers has launched a new visitor program for one of Marion's best loved historical sites.

The Friends of Annie Doolan's Cottage recently announced they are opening up the local heritage listed building from which they take their name for group bookings and guided tours.

Groups can now also order tea and scones when booking a visit.

Annie Doolan's Cottage is located in the heart of Marion Historic Village and was originally used as a convent school by the Sisters of St Joseph, which was founded by the Blessed Mary Mackillop.

The cottage was built in 1876 and visitors can see a school room from the era and a 1940s kitchen. It is named after its last resident who lived there

There is a scale model of Marion Village in 1949 that shows a sparsely populated area with almond groves, market gardens and pug holes from where clay was dug to make bricks.

Chair of the Friends of Annie Doolan's Cottage, Elizabeth Hunt, said the visitor program had been expanded to meet growing interest in local history.

"We've started taking group bookings due to increasing interest in local history, particularly from schools that want students to experience something different during an excursion,"

Ms Hunt said.

"Kids are fascinated by the old classroom, especially when they have a go writing on the slate boards as students would have done in the 1870s.

"The cottage is packed with memorabilia, including old kitchen scales, a mincer, photographs, crockery and school timetable."

Annie Doolan's Cottage is owned by the Catholic Church Endowment Society and leased by the friends group.

Tours are free, however, a gold coin donation is welcome and there is a small charge for tea and scones which can be enjoyed on the cottage's lawn.

Open days are held on the fourth Sunday of each month.

Ms Hunt said there were opportunities for people to help out by volunteering.

"More volunteers to help with tours, maintaining the cottage and preparing tea and scones would be welcome," she said.

The City of Marion provides an annual contribution of \$4500 to the friends group to support maintenance of the cottage.

I am about to complete my first year as your ward Councillor. Recent items of note are:

Reserve Street Dog Park, Trott Park

\$100,000 was provided by the State Government towards this project. We resisted pressure to rush the development as this would have resulted in a sub-standard unusable dog park. With ongoing consultation and the dedication of Council staff we proposed a much larger park. I am pleased that Council agreed to provide an additional \$126,000 to fund the final design. Construction will begin very soon.

Soccer at Capella Reserve

There has been an ongoing chronic shortage of soccer facilities. Recent negotiations will now allow the transformation of Capella Reserve into a permanent soccer training area for our junior players. The installation of permanent goal posts will provide a much needed public soccer facility. Thank you to Sheidow Park Cricket Club, in particular the committee, who made this possible by relocating their club to an alternative site.

The Cove Sports soccer pitch will also be getting a make-over. Council has agreed to replace the broken irrigation system. The lack of irrigation and heavy use left the pitch virtually grass free and unusable at the end of the soccer season.

These decisions will allow the club to increase its membership.

Hallett Cove Foreshore

A stormwater upgrade is programmed for 2016. I will continue to explore opportunities to improve this area as they arise.

PARK HOLME, MORPHETTVILLE

Council recently passed a motion opposing the Hon Michelle Lensink's Statutes Amendment (Decriminalisation of Sex Work) Bill 2015 which is before State Parliament.

The legislation is based on the flawed model that decriminalises prostitution and transfers policing of it to local councils. The model is in operation in New Zealand and New South Wales and has been a disaster for both.

New Zealand

Deputy Mayor of Christchurch Ngaire Button has stated that: "What we've found is that this whole thing has taken up so many resources... Our staff have spent hours, weeks, months, over the last few years trying to manage prostitution in the city. We had 300 submissions from various groups in the city about signage. We had a big stack of submissions, hundreds – asking us not to allow brothels in their area. We can't do anything about street prostitution..."

New South Wales

Hornsby Council in Sydney spent over \$100K to unsuccessfully shut down an alleged illegal brothel. The attempt even included the extraordinary step of paying a private investigator to have sex with a prostitute. But when the matter went to court, the judge held that evidence was required of two or more prostitutes to shut down the premises.

Horsnby Councillor Nick Berman stated: "To have to invest ratepayers' money to pay private investigators to have sex with prostitutes is, in itself, ludicrous. But to now have to send two, three, even four men in is bordering on the unbelievable."

Yes it is. South Australia should learn from these examples and not go there.



The newly elected Council has continued to work hard to find savings.

I will continue to keep my election promise of "keeping rates low" and never vote for a rates hike above CPL

Even though Council has forecast borrowings increasing up to \$25.1 million by 30 June, 2016, prudent financial management by Elected Members means Council currently only has a debt of \$11.9 million. This has enabled us to make thousands of dollars of savings in interest payments on behalf of our ratepayers. We have worked hard to be prudent and efficient and will continue to do so.

It should be noted that in the past Council has had the capacity to fund some, and in a number of cases, all, funding requirements of major projects via our treasury management policy. As such there may not be a need to borrow the full \$25.1 million currently forecast in the 2015/16 Annual Business Plan & Budget.

With continued increases in the Emergency Services Levy, increases in energy bills and water bills, as well as media talk on increasing the GST to 15%, the residents of Marion cannot afford Council rate rises between 4 to 5%, which was the case with the last Council.

We only had a rate rise of 2.9% for 2014/15, which I think is still too high!

I will always continue to vote against projects that waste ratepayers' money.

During the First World War, 207 individuals from the Edwardstown district enlisted for service. Of this group, many never returned and numerous bravery awards were issued.

After the war, local residents decided that something needed to be done to honour those from our area who had bravely enlisted to fight for their country. Local community members reached into their own pockets to develop the Edwardstown Memorial Oval and commission an honour board.

The Edwardstown Honour Board was hand carved by local Edwardstown coach builder, Pengelly (who also built the 'red rattler' trams). It was one of the most ornate honour boards in existence.

It was proudly displayed for decades in the Edwardstown Institute. In the 1980s, the Edwardstown Institute was demolished. However prior to demolition, the honour board was removed - the legend of the missing honour board has circulated through older locals ever since.

However, in very exciting recent news, a local, dedicated, amateur historian has found the original honour board at the Warradale Barracks.

Edwardstown Memorial Oval and the Edwardstown Honour Board both memorialise the same 207 people, however the honour board has never resided at the oval.

Council has recently endorsed a motion to discuss with Warradale Barracks the possibility of one day bringing this valuable piece of our local history back onto public display as the centrepiece of a redeveloped Edwardstown Memorial Oval.

This is an important piece of our local history. As a society, we must understand our history in order to define our future.



ON THE GROUND

Snakes and ladders come to Edwardstown

A playground in Edwardstown has been given a unique \$220,000 makeover based on a snakes and ladders theme.

The Edwardstown Soldiers' Memorial Recreation Ground play area has been revamped to include a three-metre long concrete snake rendered with coloured pebbles for children to climb on, log balance beams, swings, a maze made from railway sleepers and a slide.

A new multipurpose sports court that can be used for netball, basketball and soccer has been installed along with a sand play area, junior climbing frame, water pump, log balance beams and chalk board wall.

City of Marion landscape architect Peter Semple said the playground had been designed to encourage repeated visits from children and families.

"The playground is based on nature play and uses different heights of equipment made from natural materials to make it exciting for kids so they keep coming back for more," Mr Semple said.

"A timber artist created carved totems, a bench and log balance beams.

"Local families helped develop the concept at community consultation sessions in June last year, after which detailed designs were created."

Construction began in July this year and was completed in November.

Designs for further work at Edwardstown Soldiers' Memorial Recreation Ground, including improvements to lighting and the velodrome, are expected to begin later this year.

The work is part of a planned \$650,000 overhaul of the site which is being funded by the City of Marion, the Department of Planning Transport and Infrastructure and the Office for Recreation and Sport.

Plympton Oval playground has received a \$140,000 revamp, including new climbing and toddler play stations, swings, picnic table and landscaping.

Shade sails have been installed over the play equipment.

Green Army digs deep

The City of Marion Workskil Youth Green Army group has planted more than 15,000 native plants across the region as part of a major revegetation project.

The Green Army is a hands-on, practical environmental action program that supports local environmental and heritage conservation projects across Australia. It is an Australian Government program for young people aged 17 to 24 who are interested in protecting their local environment.

The group dug 10,000 holes at the Oaklands Wetland biodiversity corridor which enabled 250 volunteers to plant trees and shrubs at the site on Planet Ark Tree Day in July.

The plantings were undertaken at 10 sites, including Morphett Rd Reserve, Roy Lander Reserve, Trott Park Creek and Glade Crescent Reserve.

Plantings aim to improve endangered Grey Box woodlands and provide habitat for vulnerable birds, including the Black-Chinned Honey Eater and Yellow Tailed Black Cockatoo.

The Green Army's Scott Kerry-Pinch, Michael Ward and Colin Soper helped plant more than 15,000 plants.





Reaching for the stars

Operators of small businesses working from home can now reach for the stars thanks to an innovative co-working venture which brings diverse companies together under one roof.

CO-HAB provides a shared working environment where people can hire desks, offices, a boardroom and function centre, interact and exchange ideas.

Since opening at Tonsley in April this year, CO-HAB has welcomed more than 50 entrepreneurs, including engineers, industrial designers, computer programmers and software developers. Space utility company, AU Launch Services,

Space utility company, AU Launch Services, was one of the first to sign up.

The consultancy is aiming to be at the forefront of the new wave of the Australian space industry by helping launch miniature satellites known as CubeSats which can be used for communications, taking photographs and testing new technology.

AU Launch Services prepares vital documentation for CubeSat manufacturers, owners and operators involving risk analysis, insurance and booking a place on a rocket, manager Michael Leslie said.

"Engineers traditionally don't like paperwork so we take it off their hands and streamline the process of putting satellites in space," Mr Leslie said. "CO-HAB is a vibrant place to work because it as has all the facilities you need to run a business and makes it easy to meet people in complementary industries, including manufacturing and simulation.

"We're working with start-ups in Melbourne and Sydney and are looking to expand into other areas of the space industry."

Businesses can rent a desk and co-working office with access to high-speed internet from \$80 to \$200 per month depending on their requirements.

Facilities include an open workspace with 42 individual workstations, six studio offices, six meeting rooms, a function room for up to 80 people, boardroom, kitchen and three quiet rooms for Skype meetings.

Printing, scanning, photocopying, internet and tea and coffee is included.

CO-HAB manager Wiehann de Klerk said the facility had been designed to help small businesses achieve their potential.

"Working from CO-HAB can increase your sales and creativity, expand your business and social circles and provides access to professional facilities at a discount rate," Mr de Klerk said.

"CO-HAB is a thriving community of entrepreneurs who can work on projects together by leveraging different skill sets, share ideas and learn from each other.

NO LIMIT

Manager AU Launch Services Michael Leslie and CO-HAB manager Wiehann de Klerk believe that small businesses can thrive by working together.

"Our members can get out of the house and hold presentations, product launches and meetings in a modern, well-equipped office."

Mr de Klerk said members have the chance to benefit from a commercialisation program designed to accelerate success and growth called Innovyz which established CO-HAB.

CO-HAB is not-for-profit, is administered by Innovyz and supported by the Department of State Development and Renewal SA.

CO-HAB is located at Tonsley, Level 1, Mitsubishi Administration Building, 1284 South Road Clovelly Park.



DEVELOPMENT MATTERS

Have fun in the pool - and stay safe

Summer is here and backyard pools are busy with people cooling off and having fun.

While we want people to enjoy themselves in their pools, we also want them to be safe. This article outlines some important safety tips and regulations for pool owners and users.

Maintaining pool fencing

Regularly test and adjust gates around pools to ensure they self-close and self-latch. Test gates from fully and partially opened positions to make sure they close whatever the level of force applied.

Gates must be secured so that they cannot be pulled open when latched.

Check that fence panels are secure and fix wear and tear, such as rusty or missing screws. Also check that gaps underneath and at the sides of fences do not exceed 10cm and that the ground directly underneath fencing panels is solid no garden beds or lawn.

Climbable objects, including pots, outdoor furniture and barbecues should be kept away from the pool fence. Cut back trees and shrubs so there are no branches that can be climbed within 90cm of a fence.

Pool aids and toys should be stored securely out

Supervising children

Adults should always supervise young children near water. Don't leave older children to supervise younger children.

It's a good idea to designate a child supervisor if you're having a party.

Remember that owners of pools or spas have an obligation to supervise children on their property, whether or not the pools or spas are in use.

Spas and inflatable pools

Outdoor and indoor spas require Council approval and must be fenced as if they are a new pool (this does not apply to spas in residential bathrooms).

Inflatable pools that can be filled to a height of 30cm or more must also be fenced. They may require Council approval if they contain a filtration system.

If a swim spa or inflatable pool is not adequately fenced, Council is empowered to have it emptied.

Making Marion proud

A man who has overcome depression to lead a social support group, a woman who is part of a team that has prepared almost one million Meals on Wheels and an SES volunteer who helped find a missing child have been named the Pride of Marion.

They are the first people to be honoured in the new initiative that celebrates the outstanding contribution people make to our community.

Tony Fogarty's life was turned upside down in 2001 when he went from being the life and soul of the party to becoming housebound with depression and memory loss.

After almost 10 years of confinement, Tony, now 61, forced himself to leave the house.

"In 2010 I took a deep breath and made myself walk to a breakfast event at Trott Park Neighbourhood Centre after hearing about it from a friend," Tony said.

"It was so good to meet people that I got involved and set up a monthly bloke's brekky where I now cook bacon and eggs for about 30 men who use it as a reason to get out of the house and make friends.

"As a result of depression and memory loss I had to learn to read and write again, but have

helped build the centre's wood oven, am involved in the woodwork group and really enjoy putting something back into the community."

When Warradale Meals on Wheels began operating in 1990 Yvonne Curran was one of the first to volunteer.

Twenty-five years later she is part of a team that by next year will have prepared and delivered one million meals to people within the City of Marion.

For Yvonne, 76, helping people live independently in their homes by preparing a nourishing meal is all the motivation she needs.

"I value living in my home and it's satisfying to know I'm helping people enjoy those same comforts by preparing food," Yvonne said.

"If you have a good life, don't take it for granted, consider yourself lucky, and support others... I expect to keep making apple and apricot strudel for a few years yet."

Jess Doyle was just 21 when she began volunteering for the SES to learn new skills.

Now, aged 29, the State Government administration worker, who covers the Marion Council area from the SES office at Lonsdale in her spare time, has already racked up a wealth of experience.

"I've travelled to Queensland to battle floods, tied tarpaulins on roofs to save homes from storms and had the satisfaction of being involved in a search that found a missing child," Jess said.

"My family is from Hallett Cove and my partner plays footy for Marion Rams, so we are all part of the community

"It's rewarding to be in a team that can be called to the front line in times of need."
