Council bridges gap to teen employment

Two local teenagers are boosting their skills and career prospects thanks to Marion Council's inaugural work placement program.

Gap Year for School Leavers combines on the job training with paid work over 12 months and involves participants in all areas of Council operations, including designing and building reserves, engineering, and environmental projects.

The scheme has been developed to provide young people with the skills and knowledge that will help them identify a career and increase their chances of finding work.

CEO Adrian Skull said Council was in a unique position to help young people.

"Gap Year for School Leavers introduces young people to a broad range of potential careers and provides meaningful work experience," Mr Skull said.

"It can kick start a person's career. You can't get a job without experience, and you need experience to get a job – so that is what we're providing.

"The pilot scheme also allows teenagers to trial different jobs so they can learn a variety of skills."

The first school leavers to be selected for the program are Ben McLean and Emma Brooks, who are both 18 and completed year 12 at Hamilton Secondary College last year.

"It's exciting to be thrown into full-time work with so many opportunities to learn and make an impact," Ben said.

"Many of my friends are finding it hard to get a job, so I hope the placement will improve my chances. I see myself working outdoors and am looking forward to getting 'hands on' experience."

Emma Brooks deferred a degree in Business and Human Resource Management so she could participate in the scheme.

"I've already had my eyes opened to many jobs I hadn't thought about, including strategy and planning," Emma said.

"Working in different areas will help me decide on a career and the skills I need to develop."

Council endorsed *Gap Year for School Leavers* at its meeting in September last year.

CEO's comment

Welcome to the first edition of City Limits for 2017.

The new year has got off to a flying start with the creation of the new suburb of Tonsley in a southern portion of Clovelly Park. This is a positive step as it connects the local area to the Tonsley Innovation District which provides a unique mix of education and collaboration between high-tech businesses.

We're lucky to have the Tonsley Innovation District right on our doorstep. If you haven't already done so, it's worth taking the time to see it for yourself.

This year will see Council bring the development of major sporting infrastructure closer by progressing work on a revamped Edwardstown Oval and a new BMX track in O'Halloran Hill.

These projects will cost a combined total of \$11.5 million. Council has secured \$6.75 million in grant funding towards this work.

In addition, we have planned improvements to netball facilities, the upgrade of four reserves, and

are preparing for the redevelopment of Oaklands Estate Reserve and Playground. We will also be consulting with the community on proposed work at the Oaklands Recreation Plaza.

The design work for the amphitheatre at Grand Central Reserve, Hallett Cove Foreshore, is also underway and is expected to be considered by Council in March this year.

I would like to add my congratulations to the City of Marion Australia Day award winners who are named in a special back page feature of this magazine. They are the heart and soul of our community and we owe them our gratitude. Regards,

Mayor's comment

Your Council elected in 2014 set about reviewing every aspect of Council operations. Over the last two years we have found literally millions of dollars in savings, enabling us to minimise borrowings as we build and improve community facilities.

One particularly controversial expenditure item under review has been membership of the Local Government Association (LGA). It costs ratepayers about \$100,000 a year. We have rigorously tested whether or not ratepayers are getting value for money.

The difficulty is that the LGA's primary role, "advocacy for local government", is difficult to value. I have been encouraging the LGA to demonstrate more tangible benefits: eg cheap staff training; sharing pricing information for products like footpaths and roads; and joint procurement to save costs.

Then there are the insurance schemes promoted by the LGA (for our property insurance and workers' compensation). Since the SA Auditor-General severely criticised management of these schemes

18 months ago, we are looking at alternatives. The LGA have had consultants review the insurance schemes; at the time of writing this, however, they had not shared the full results.

Regardless of the LGA issue, it makes sense to promote collaboration between councils to increase efficiencies. For example, we've just built one of the best Council depots in SA; why does Holdfast Bay need to run a separate depot ten minutes down the road? We could share!

I hope that gives you some insight into just one of the hundreds of issues your Council is grappling with, as we try to deliver what you want, while extracting no more than we need to in Council rates.

Swimming Australia's new national junior program, Optus Junior Dolphins, launched in January with a helping hand from Olympic legend Kyle Chalmers.

Gold medallist Kyle joined future hopeful Olympic swimmers to celebrate the launch at the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre which will deliver the program.

Developed by Swimming Australia, Optus Junior Dolphins has been created to encourage kids to have fun with their friends while improving their swimming and water familiarity, without the pressure of competition or serious training.

Children will have the opportunity to learn skills and develop personally through games and swimming activities in a fun, safe, and social environment.

Swimming Australia President, John Bertrand AO, said the program would break down barriers and allow children to simply enjoy swimming.

"It is often said that swimming is a sport for life; from cradle to grave, and Optus Junior Dolphins has been created to provide kids the opportunity to keep swimming after they have learnt the basic skills," Mr Bertrand said.

Local businesses and the community are being asked to open their hearts and wallets to help children with a disability.

Channel Nine has joined forces with the City of Marion and the Touched by Olivia Foundation (TBOF) to help raise funds to build South Australia's first inclusive playground at Hendrie Street Reserve, Park Holme.

The project will bring children of all ages and abilities together to play side by side.

The foundation has so far raised about \$63,000 of its \$400,000 contribution to the project.

New plans and sponsorship packages released by TBOF show how businesses and families can donate money for specialised equipment including a tubular slide, carousel, trike track and swings as well as a nature play creek, shelter and trees.

Channel Nine is showcasing the project on Nine News and airing community service announcements urging South Australians to get behind the project.

Nine News presenters Brenton Ragless, Kate Collins as well as Nine News weather presenter Jessica Braithwaite and the hosts of TV show Adelady, Hayley Pearson and Lauren De Cesare, will front the appeal.

Brenton, a local in the area, knows first-hand the power a community can have when it comes together to make a difference. "There is a lot of money to raise but we know we can do it with the help and generosity of local businesses and community," Brenton said.

TBOF executive officer Bec Ho said the community could help turn the dream into reality.

"Sponsoring a piece of equipment is a unique opportunity to ensure children with a range of disabilities, including mobility, vision and hearing impairments and autism can have fun and not feel sidelined," Ms Ho said.

"We're appealing to businesses and the local community to dig deep and help turn this dream into reality.

City of Marion general manager Abby Dickson thanked Channel Nine for coming on board.

"Channel Nine will raise the profile of this wonderful project which will hopefully translate into the funding the foundation needs," Ms Dickson said.

The total cost of the playground is about \$960,000.

The City of Marion has committed \$310,000 plus design and construction services for the playground and the Department of Planning Transport and Infrastructure (DPTI) \$250,000.

Work is scheduled to be completed by December this year.

Sun to shine on local theatre group's 50th year

Galleon Theatre Group will bring the curtain up on its 50th birthday celebrations with a performance of David Williamson's *Let the Sunshine* at the Marion Cultural Centre in May.

The legendary Australian playwright's comedy about what happens when people of widely different political views are forced to co-exist will be Galleon's 89th production since it formed in 1967.

President Kym Clayton, who plays the part of Toby in the upcoming production, said the play was a fitting way to mark Galleon's 50th anniversary.

"Let the Sunshine is a terrific play that lets our actors and production crew show what they can do," Mr Clayton said.

"At Galleon, we find a place for everyone who is passionate about theatre and stage a wide variety of plays, so there are opportunities for actors well as people who want to volunteer as set builders, stage hands, lighting, and sound operators.

"Amateur theatre is an enjoyable way to build skills and confidence and play a part in telling great stories."

The award-winning amateur company started out at Marino Community Hall on Newland Avenue where it staged 34 shows over 11 years.

In 1978, Galleon shifted productions to Marion's Pioneer Hall before moving to the Domain Theatre at the Marion Cultural Centre in 2002 where it now stages two shows each year.

Mr Clayton said Galleon's past members included actress Amber McMahon who now performs with the Sydney Theatre Company and London-based stage manager, Rowan Yates.

Galleon's production of the play *Rumours* won the Adelaide Theatre Guide's award for best comedy in 2016.

Let the Sunshine can be seen at the Marion Cultural Centre's Domain Theatre from Thursday, May 4 to Saturday, May 13. Tickets are \$24 and \$20 for concessions.

Darlington update

The Darlington Upgrade Project is another stage in the development of Adelaide's North-South Corridor and will deliver an upgrade of about 3.3kms of the existing Main South Road, including:

A non-stop motorway between the Southern Expressway and Tonsley Boulevard

- A lowered, non-stop motorway underneath Flinders Drive, Sturt Road, Sutton Road/ Mimosa Terrace and Tonsley Boulevard
- Grade separation of the Main South Road/ Ayliffes Road/Shepherds Hill Road intersection
- Main South Road (at grade) surface roads along both sides of the lowered motorway to provide connections to Flinders Drive, Sturt Road and most local roads
- Full free flow interchange at the Southern Expressway/Main South Road with dedicated ramps providing direct access to the new motorway and Main South Road

A key priority is keeping traffic flowing during peak times and maintaining access to critical facilities such as Flinders Medical Centre, Flinders University and Flinders Private Hospital.

The construction program will be staged, with new surface roads and bridges constructed first so traffic can be shifted onto these new roads while the lowered motorway is being constructed. This will ensure the current number of lanes available in peak periods are retained while providing a safe environment for road users and construction workers.

Red tape slashed in business boost

Red tape will be slashed and Development Applications fast tracked as part of a new Council initiative to create jobs and boost business investment.

The new plan seeks to pave the way for local businesses to expand and attract visitors to the region.

Open for Business will be backed by workshops in marketing, finance and doing business online to build skills among entrepreneurs.

A promotional program to draw visitors to the region is being developed and surveys undertaken to improve understanding of the needs of local businesses.

CEO City of Marion Adrian Skull said Council was doing all it could to help businesses succeed.

"Open for Business puts businesses in the driving seat by removing obstacles and creating opportunities for growth," Mr Skull said.

"Marion is close to the CBD and airport and home to the Tonsley Innovation Precinct, making it ideally placed for investment.

We are creating a more business friendly environment. Staff from right across the organisation are looking at practical ways to help businesses succeed, including slashing red tape."

Council's payment terms have been reduced from up to 60 days to 30 to improve cash flow. reduce costs and provide certainty for small companies.

Development Applications for businesses are being prioritised and a new process introduced that will see planning and building assessments undertaken simultaneously to reduce wait time.

Support for companies has increased with a joint partnership between Marion and Onkaparinga councils and the Tonsley Small Business Advisory Service.

The advisory service is expanding its reach after delivering more than 600 one-on-one sessions over the past year to help start-ups and new businesses grow.

Patritti Wines managing director Ines Patritti said local councils were ideally positioned to support business.

"Open for Business has the potential to generate more economic activity and attract companies to the area," Ms Patritti said.

"Local councils are at the root of the business community and this is an excellent idea that will have a positive impact."



New plan to promote reconciliation

A raft of new initiatives to embed reconciliation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people into the way the City of Marion works are set to be rolled out.

The recently launched *Reconciliation Action Plan* (RAP) contains 27 actions which include hosting events during National Reconciliation and NAIDOC weeks, providing work experience opportunities, hosting art exhibitions, and promoting participation in local sport.

The three-year plan has been developed with input from the Kaurna community, Elected Members and staff.

The new plan was launched in December to coincide with the unveiling of a specially commissioned artwork in Council Chambers.

Cultural Sustainability by Allan Sumner is a computer generated artwork displayed in two parts that celebrates Kaurna culture with images of artefacts and ancient sites.

City of Marion general manager operations Tony Lines said the artwork symbolises the organisation's commitment to reconciliation.

"Cultural Sustainability is a stunning artwork that takes pride of place in the Council Chambers,"
Mr Lines said.

"The City of Marion is proud to be one of about 650 organisations throughout Australia that guide our actions with a RAP.

"In 2013, Marion was among the first councils in South Australia to adopt a RAP and is now building on that initial work with this new plan."

Reconciliation Australia launched RAPs in 2006. One of the aims is to reduce the 17-year life expectancy gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.

More than 30 students and academics from Flinders University are busy designing and building a solar-powered vehicle that will race 3000km from Darwin to Adelaide in the Bridgestone World Solar Challenge from 8-15 October this year.

The Flinders Automotive Solar Team (FAST) is competing in the Cruiser class capable of carrying passengers.

This category encourages teams to come up with practical but efficient solar car solutions, including innovative approaches to energy management.

Flinders Automotive Solar Team, director of the FAST, senior engineering lecturer Dr Stuart Wildy, said Flinders students at Tonsley and the main Bedford Park campus are coming up with many bright ideas.

"The interdisciplinary nature of designing and building a car for the world's largest solar challenge provides high-level project-based learning for our students," Dr Wildy said.

"The car design brings together a wide range of our university's research expertise and capabilities, and it's fitting that it's being built in the cutting-edge advanced technology, research and development hub at Tonsley."

Tonsley by name and nature

In a nod to an important part of Australia's manufacturing history, the suburb of Tonsley officially came into being on 27 January 2017.

The 61 hectare former Mitsubishi Motors site has long been known as Tonsley, but has never been an official suburb – until now.

Last year Renewal SA and the City of Marion applied to have a portion of Clovelly Park renamed to Tonsley, and following public consultation by the City of Marion, that application was endorsed by the Office of the Surveyor General and approved by the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure.

The new suburb of Tonsley includes the former Mitsubishi site, an area south to Sturt Road, and the existing residential precinct bounded by the Tonsley rail line, Sturt Road and South Road. A small industrial precinct to the northeast of the site is also included. Land to the north of this area, to Daws Road, will continue to be in the suburb of Clovelly Park.

As well as a hub for high value manufacturing businesses and services, Tonsley has a significant research, education and training focus with Flinders University's School of Computer Science,

Engineering and Mathematics and TAFE SA's Sustainable Industries Education Centre both on site.

Key reasons for the name change included the changed land use and conditions brought about by the development of the Tonsley Innovation District as well as the historical connection with the name Tonsley.

Tonsley Park was named after Tonsley Hall in England by Richard Ragless in the late 1800s. It was farmed for several generations by his family before being developed by Chrysler in 1964.

Tonsley Innovation District is home to more than 70 business and a further 50 occupants located in co-working spaces.

Around 1000 workers are now employed in businesses operating out of Tonsley - a return to the same number of workers that were on site when Mitsubishi ceased operations in 2008.

Funding program helps clubs grow

Local sporting and community clubs are improving their grounds and facilities thanks to an innovative Council funding program.

The Community Facilities Partnership Program aims to help clubs grow by upgrading a wide range of infrastructure including clubrooms, courts and flood lighting.

The program involves clubs working with Council, State and Federal governments and other organisations to raise funding for the total value of a project.

Clubs that have benefitted from the scheme include the Hallett Cove Netball Club which now has re-surfaced courts. New lighting has been installed at Edwardstown Oval and clubrooms upgraded and a balcony installed the Cove Sports Club.

All sporting clubs and community groups that lease or licence a Marion Council-owned facility are eligible to submit an application.

The funding is available for improvements to existing infrastructure and can be used for upgrading or replacing:

- > Clubrooms
- > Halls
- > Playing fields
- > Drainage
- > Sports courts
- Support infrastructure car parks, pathways, disability access

Day-to-day maintenance work is not eligible for funding.

The Community Facilities Partnership Program enables clubs to identify and seek funding for projects through a formal process.

The program was launched in 2010 and is expected to provide about \$20 million of Council funding to clubs by 2020.

The sound of Latin infused funk, Flamenco guitar and Indonesian rhythms is set to have families dancing in the street when Marion's biggest festival kicks off on Saturday, March 25.

Marion Celebrates has been revamped as a twilight street party featuring a five-hour stage show of multicultural music and dance, food trucks, a community art project, open air market, and entertainment for kids.

Festival goers will also get a close up view of unicycle tricks, eye popping contortions and magic.

The free community event will be held in and around the Marion Cultural Centre plaza and the adjacent Warracowie Way, which will be closed to traffic.

Also performing will be Adelaide born magician, escapologist and contortionist Malachi Frost and Casa de Flamenco who will serve up a taste of Spanish music and dance.

There will be two choirs, brass band music, and a display of contemporary Japanese dance from Hallett Cove East Primary School.

This will be the 10th Marion Celebrates, and the first time it has been held at the Marion Cultural Centre since 2007.

Councils will no longer be able to intervene in liquor licensing processes once development approval has been given if the State Government passes proposed changes to the Liquor Licensing Act 1997.

Currently, section 76(2) of the Liquor Licensing Act 1997 states:

"A council in whose area licensed premises or premises proposed to be licensed are situated may intervene in proceedings before a licensing authority for the purpose of introducing evidence, or making representations, on any question before the authority."

Past Supreme Court judge Tim Anderson, who conducted the review of the Liquor Licensing Act, said that there "is unnecessary duplication and expense in the system which prevails at the present time."

However, LGA President Mayor Lorraine Rosenberg says otherwise:

"The Government's proposed changes would limit the ability for a council to influence liquor licensing in their local communities on matters related to the planning approval process."

"... council members provide the liquor licensing authority with a unique and valued insight into the history of licensed premises within a particular area, and the potential sensitivities surrounding these premises that may not be revealed through a planning process", Mayor Rosenberg said.

"It's important to note that when residents have an issue with excessive noise or anti-social behaviour from licensed premises, they'll often report this to their local council", she added.



The issue of development and sub-division in our neighbourhoods needs to be urgently addressed to only allow subdivisions that complement and improve our neighbourhoods, instead of those that degrade them.

The State Planning rules that dictate the type of development, I believe, do not give councils enough control over what can be built nor give Council the option to include broader considerations such as the impact of the current number of subdivisions in a particular location.

Last Council term the Planning Department advised me the number of dwellings in our Council area had increased by an average 1.5 per cent over the preceding 10 years. Yet, based on what residents see, the perception of the rate of subdivision is higher as subdivisions tend to cluster together.

The problem with this is that it often creates parking problems, increases stormwater issues and makes the streets feel less like home for many adversely affected.

Residents have raised concerns that subdivisions have also inadvertently caused traffic hazards by the position of driveways and the reduced line of sight along streets and at intersections.

The rules also allow for some subdivisions and rebuilds to happen without neighbours even knowing until works begin, making people feel ignored.

State Planning law needs to change; the requirement for rejuvenating old housing and increasing density needs to be balanced more towards preventing the foreseeable issues caused by the current volume, proximity and inappropriate types of development happening.

I hope our state representatives can take swift action on these community concerns.

SEAVIEW DOWNS, O'HALLORAN HILL (PART), TROTT PARK, SHEIDOW PARK (PART), SEACLIFF PARK (PART), HALLETT COVE (PART)

As the Residents of O'Halloran Hill, west of Main South Road, would already know, the Luke Court Reserve is likely to be sold off after community consultation and the State Government's approval, a process which may take many months. It is apparently not being used sufficiently to justify the thousands of dollars spent in administration and maintenance costs every year while there are four other reserves within around 500 metres.

I find it regrettable that we cannot keep all public spaces. Unfortunately, as all organisations, both private and public, we need to keep the budget tight and need to "rationalise" some of our costs, so that the council rate increases can be kept to a minimal level.

The next step that I am supporting is to include adult play equipment in various play spaces so that we adults can maintain better fitness, and have some fun while we're at it.

Last, but not least; the team of staff who administer the community gardens in the City of Marion are experiencing a significant transition period, so that at present no one is actually doing that job.

A new staff member is being recruited to fill this role.

WARRADALE, OAKLANDS PARK, DOVER GARDENS, SEACOMBE GARDENS, MARION (PART)

One house comes down and two go up, or three or four go up? Have you noticed this in your street lately? Is the nature and character of your street and neighbourhood changing rapidly? When those houses go up, do we lose significant trees and maybe even the street trees?

When those new houses go up with all those extra driveways, do you now find it difficult to find a place to put the garbage bin out? Do these new houses on small blocks have a garage that has become a storage area or the pool room and are the cars now on the street?

With many more cars parked in the street, have you found it difficult to navigate your street to the point that even the garbage truck or a fire truck cannot get through? Has motor vehicle crime increased due to the smorgasbord of vehicles parked on our streets?

What has contributed to this problem?

In terms of State planning Policy, one factor is the poor execution of the 30-Year Plan by the State Government by allowing and encouraging such ad hoc and reckless development in our streets to satisfy the insatiable appetite of developers.

To top it off there is such an indulgence called the Residential Code where the State Government overrules Council on limits to bulk/scale and even privacy considerations.

But Council itself is not without fault here. The use of what is called "Not Seriously at Variance" or how long is a piece of string, is allowing even more overdevelopment in our residential streets. WARRADALE, OAKLANDS PARK,

I would like to take this opportunity to point out something that perhaps didn't receive the attention it could have in the media recently.

Late last year, we voted to replace all the street lighting in our Council area with LED units. This has some real financial benefits to our residents, cutting significantly the amount of power we use on this important service.

I know I am not alone in applauding the work done by council staff to bring this project to the vote and I was impressed that it was supported by all the Councillors. With a spend of somewhere near \$3 million dollars and a payback of somewhere near six years, this project certainly stacks up financially in our favour, notwithstanding the superior quality, modern lighting we are installing. While we are on the topic of energy saving, we will soon start to roll out our new solar infrastructure on several key buildings around the city. Once again, a sizeable investment to reduce our future power overheads.

Similarly, the business case suggests a payback of the order of five to six years and with an infrastructure lifetime of somewhere near 25 years, again, we come out well in front.

BEDFORD PARK (PART), CLOVELLY PARK (PART),

We reflect together on successes during 2016. There are agreed plans for a home for four indoor sports courts, for the Mitchell Park Neighbourhood Centre, as well as the Dover Gardens Obedience Club and other current users. This new shared building at Mitchell Park Sports and Community Centre is really important for this local community. We continue to work with Federal and State Governments.

Our Water Irrigation Hierarchy assists Council. The \$400,000 a year budget for water for reserves is now being spent sensibly. We also made decisions on leasing arrangements for Council properties to sports and community groups. Lighting, both the swap to LEDs (light emitting diodes) which use under half the amount of electricity, and the installation of solar cells on our buildings to produce electricity, will soon create savings for ratepayers.

In 2017, with expectation of a smaller increase in rates, the Elected Member team continues to use Council resources as wisely as possible. I want to see progress on the upgraded tennis courts at Seaview High School, Seacombe Heights. The lease between Marion Council and Marion Sports and Community Centre remained unsigned at time the magazine went to print. I hope it is soon agreed. The winners could be the teams that use the Marion oval for their sports. Under the new streetscape guidelines, Finniss St, Marion and Alawoona Ave, Mitchell Park upgrades are awaited eagerly.

I hope to meet you this year at Marion Celebrates at the Marion Cultural Centre on Saturday,

Food safety tips

Most of us enjoy getting together with family and friends and cooking a barbecue during warm weather. To ensure your next get together if remembered for all the right reasons, we've put together some simple tips for storing and cooking food safely.



ALL SMILES

Following simple food safety tips will mean your barbecue is remembered for all the right reasons.

- Store perishable food at less than 5°C (including pre-prepared salads, cold meats, dips, patés and raw food for the barbecue)
- Keep food in a fridge and leave drinks in an esky so the temperature isn't affected by the fridge door being opened and closed regularly
- If you can't keep perishable food cool, make sure you don't leave it out of the fridge for more than four hours
- > If you expect to return food to the fridge, don't leave it out for more than two hours
- Keep raw meat at the bottom of your esky or fridge so juices don't drip down and contaminate salad or cooked food
- Use a clean plate and clean utensils for cooked meat – never re-use the same items for raw meat without washing them
- > Wash your hands before preparing ready to eat food such as salad, particularly if you've been handling raw meat
- Sausages, hamburgers and poultry needs to be cooked all the way through. If you have a thermometer, check that they reach 75° C. Alternatively, check juices are clear in colour.

No rates windfall from subdivisions

Contrary to a commonly held belief, Council does not receive a cash windfall when blocks of land are subdivided to increase the number of rateable properties.

Council is responsible for maintaining about \$1 billion worth of community assets, including roads, footpaths, reserves, stormwater drainage and libraries.

Each year, Council sets a budget to maintain infrastructure and deliver services. The current budget is around \$86 million per annum, which is predominantly derived from rates.

To determine the amount each ratepayer contributes, Council divides the total required rate revenue by the sum of all property values in the city. This provides what is known as "the rate in the dollar".

The value of a property is then multiplied by the rate in the dollar. This shows the rates payable for that property.

The rate in the dollar is adjusted annually to offset movements in property values across the city. This ensures Council doesn't collect revenue over and above what is required for its annual budget.

House values are determined independently by the Office of the Valuer General.

In setting its rates, Council aims to provide services and maintain infrastructure without placing a financial burden on ratepayers.

Upgrades to footpaths, roads and stormwater drainage that may be required as part of new developments are factored into budgets.

The average household rate rise in the City of Marion for 2016/17 was 2.5 per cent. This follows 2.9 per cent in 2015/16 which was the lowest rate rise in more than 10 years.

NO WINDFALL

Council does not receive a cash windfall when land is subdivided.

DEVELOPMENT MATTERS

Local Heritage Places

This article aims to improve understanding of Local Heritage Places, how they are protected, and the type of support the City of Marion provides to owners.

What is a Local Heritage Place?

A Local Heritage Place is a place that is identified as having significance to the area or providing a physical link to the past.

These places reflect the styles, values and amenity of the times in which they were built and have shaped the City of Marion.

The heritage listing of these places ensures they are protected for the appreciation of future generations.

One of the ways heritage is conserved in Marion is to list 'Local Heritage Places' in the Marion Development Plan. In order to be considered for a listing, a place must satisfy specific criteria set out in the Development Act 1993.

LOCAL HERITAGE

- 1. Marion Community House Warradale
- 2. Vineyard Oaklands Road, Park Holme
- 3. Lighthouse Marino
- 4. St Anthony's Church and School Edwardstown

There are currently 55 places in the City of Marion listed in the Development Plan as Local Heritage Places. These include:

- > St Anthony's Church and School Castle Street, Edwardstown
- > Former Marion Inn Finniss Street, Marion
- > Vineyard Oaklands Road, Park Holme
- Former Marion Council Chambers Sturt Road, Marion
- > Lighthouse Marino

What does being a Local Heritage Place mean in terms of developing/alterations?

- Changes are permitted to a Local Heritage Place but can be limited.
- It is mandatory to receive Development Approval before undertaking any development as works undertaken to a Local Heritage Place must maintain its heritage value and be sympathetic to its design and style.
- > Generally, this only affects external aspects of the building or place. Changes to the interior can be modern and contemporary.
- A Local Heritage Place cannot be demolished unless the structural condition of the building is an unacceptable risk to public or private safety.

Will the City of Marion provide any assistance?

To assist owners of Local Heritage Places free, expert advice on building, maintenance, conservation and renovation proposals can be sought from the City of Marion's Consultant Heritage Adviser.

The City of Marion has also established a Local Heritage Incentive Fund to:


- Help with the costs of maintenance and certain upgrades to heritage buildings
- Promote the effective conservation of heritage buildings
- > Enhance the viability of such buildings; and
- Enable owners to undertake maintenance and conservation work which may otherwise be a financial burden.

Financial assistance is a direct subsidy of the costs of conservation work. Each property is eligible for a maximum of \$2500 per budget year, with not more than 30 percent of the cost of the work being subsidised.

Australia Day honours

A volunteer who teaches English to refugees and a woman who co-founded a charity to help homeless women have joined Olympic champion Kyle Chalmers as the City of Marion's Australia Day Award winners.

Marion Mayor Kris Hanna presented the awards at a special Australia Day ceremony in front of more than 100 family and friends at Marion RSL on Thursday, 26 January.

The winners are:

- > Citizen of the Year Robyn Richards
- > Young Citizen of the Year Amy Rust
- Community Event of the Year– Maker Faire 2016
- Sportsperson/team of the YearKyle Chalmers

Mr Hanna said Clovelly Park resident Robyn Richards, 60, was an inspirational volunteer.

"Robyn has valiantly refused to let a near fatal brain aneurism slow her down. She welcomes new arrivals to our community by teaching them English," Mr Hanna said. "Robyn has become an integral part of Mitchell Park Neighbourhood Centre where she also organises outings for the elderly."

In 2009, Mrs Richards suffered a brain aneurism that left her "broken, anxious and emotional."

Her response was to join the 'Wacky Wednesday' social group at Mitchell Park Neighbourhood Centre and begin teaching English to new arrivals.

"Volunteering has helped me regain my confidence and feel the satisfaction of giving something back to people," Mrs Richards said.

"I was thrilled to be named Citizen of the Year at such an amazing event.

"I also volunteered for the Special Olympics Basketball program as a book keeper and support the 'Share the Dignity' project which donates toiletries to women in need... I don't have any plans to stop."

Young Citizen Amy Rust, 29, lives in Seaview Downs and co-founded the charity Essentials for Women SA.

Mr Hanna said she was changing the lives of our most vulnerable.

"Amy has taken the initiative to support homeless women, refugees, and women fleeing domestic violence by collecting and distributing more than 220,000 packs of toiletries," Mr Hanna said.

"She has forged relationships with business and secured a van to expand the operation."

Ms Rust was a State Finalist in the Young Australian of the Year awards.

Sportsperson of the Year is Olympic gold medalist Kyle Chalmers, who was also presented with the Key to the City of Marion in October.

"Kyle is a role model for every sportsperson. His self-discipline and his maturity brought him gold at the Rio 2016 Olympics," Mr Hanna said.

November's Maker Faire - organised by volunteers - was a unique event that drew more than 5000 people to Tonsley to explore technology, science, arts, engineering and food sustainability.

Mr Hanna thanked all 18 nominees for their outstanding service to the community.

The Australia Day awards included a citizenship ceremony for 51 new Australians. Earlier in the day, 20 new citizens were welcomed at Hallett Cove Foreshore at an event jointly run by the local Lions and Rotary clubs.
