

#### **MARION HISTORIC VILLAGE**



The Marion Historic Village is the historic heart of the city and locals are proud of its friendly community and unique history. 'The Marion' as it was known to locals, was once a bustling rural community producing almonds, grapes and vegetables and supporting an important brick-making industry. The Marion Historic Village walk brings the past to life and provides a fascinating insight into the area's heritage.

At the Wesleyan Chapel, keen-eyed visitors can identify early parishioners from initials carved into locally produced bricks. Early Australian innovation is evident behind the Catholic Church on Township Road where the bell tower is supported on one side

Nearby is Annie Doolan's Cottage, built in 1876 as a convent and school for Mary Mackillop's sisters of St Joseph. In late winter, blossoming almond trees in Oliphant Avenue Reserve remind visitors of agricultural days now long gone. Local stories of life in days past are celebrated through five 'Little Marion' sculptures by Gerry McMahon and the mosaic Hopscotch by Beachroad Art-works. Places of historic interest are highlighted by mosaic footpath signs by artist Irene Dougan. The Marion Historic Village Walk has been created as a partnership between the City of Marion and local residents. #### MARION DISPLAY CENTRE & MUSEUM

A group of volunteers have established displays on many different features of the village of Marion planned by Colonel William Light in 1838. The displays comprise maps, photographs, products, videos, and a touch screen. The centre is open every Sunday from 2-4pm and is run by volunteers. Admission is free. The museum is also a part of the heritage walk around the old village of Marion.

MARION VINEYARD

The Marion Vineyard is now well over 100 years old and is the world's oldest urban, commercial vineyard. It is owned by the Marion Council, but Patritti Wines are the proud custodians of the impressive vines, part of only a few tiny vineyards remaining in the once-renowned 'Garden of Adelaide' district. The village of Marion was first settled by Europeans in the 1830s, and the rich, fertile soils of the area produced copious vegetables, almonds, and stone-fruits. However, by the 1950s population growth and the demand for housing meant that much of the area was converted to residential land. Luckily, the Marion Vineyard remains – an iconic reminder of the history of the district and the quality of the produce for which it was famous. - Cool off in one of three pools, enjoy a picnic on grassed lawns and take on the 70m waterslide. The family-friendly

centre includes a 50m pool for lap and casual swimmers and shaded learner and toddler pools. The centre runs swimming lessons, aquarobics fitness classes and hosts birthday parties. There is a free barbecue, a kiosk and facilities for people with diasability. Kids under four are free and concession and family passes are available. The South Australian Aquatic and Leisure Centre is a state-ofthe-art aquatic and recreation facility designed to host elite aquatic sport and provides a range of facilities for community and visitor access.

The pool has been built to FINA standards and is eligible to host national and international swimming events (including Olympic trials). The SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre can accomodate 4,500 spectators and includes five pools to cater for all, from the elite athlete to the recreational swimmer, children and people with disabilities. The centre includes a health club, creche, function rooms, retail and catering outlets.

#### WALKING & CYCLING

The City of Marion contains a wide range of walking and cycling trails to suit all fitness levels. We've included information on three routes that provide very different experiences. Details of all local trails, including maps and videos, are available on our website.

This 7.2km walking trail extends from Marino in the north to Hallett Headland Reserve, Hallett Cove, in the south. Enjoy spectacular views of the Gulf St Vincent, world famous geological formations, public artworks and the cultural presence of Tjilbruke Dreaming. The trail includes boardwalks with steep steps that require a reasonable level of fitness, although you can join the trail at locations to suit your ability. There are cafe's at either end of the trail so you can take in the magnificent views, relax and unwind. #### STURT RIVER LINEAR PARK SHARED TRAIL



The City of Marion hosts 5kms of this flat walking and cycling path that runs alongside the Sturt River between Glenelg North and Coromandel Valley. Allow about two hours to walk from Willoughby Avenue Reserve in Glenelg, through Kenton, Oliphant and Maldon Avenue reserves and Oaklands Wetland and then to Warriparinga. Along the way there are six sites with state-of-the-art signs featuring voice recordings, Aboriginal artworks and rare photographs.

The sound recordings blend voices and atmospheric sound including didgeridoo, Kaurna language, children playing in the river, kookaburras and old trucks.

This 37km trail follows the route of the original rail corridor from Marino to Willunga and you'll need to be fit to undertake the full journey. The City of Marion hosts 8km of the route which begins at Marino Rocks station and travels along the eastern side of the Cove Rd, takes you close to the Hallett Cove Conservation Park, past Capella Drive Skate Park to Hugh Johnson Reserve where you can enjoy a barbecue. There are more than 300 reserves in the City of Marion. Here's a guide to four of them that provide a variety of ways to exercise, have fun and relax.

#### **PLYMPTON OVAL**

Climbing and toddler play stations and swings set in a beautifully landscaped area overlooking the oval make this new playground an ideal place for families to play, relax and watch sport. Large shade cloths have been fitted over the play equipment.





#### EDWARDSTOWN SOLDIERS' **MEMORIAL RECREATION GROUND**

This playground is based on a snakes and ladders theme and features areas for sand and water play, multipurpose sports courts for tennis, netball, basketball and soccer, shelters and picnic settings. There are swings, balance beams, climbing frames and a sculptured snake.





#### **GLADE CRESCENT RESERVE**




