

The Kaurna people are the original inhabitants of Marion

The original inhabitants of Marion, the Kaurna people of the Adelaide Plains, were supported by the Sturt River and surrounding bushland which provided food and shelter.

The Kaurna people's name for the Sturt River is 'Warripari'. It means 'windy place by the river'. Warripari was an important travel route for the Kaurna people.

A brief history of Council

The City of Marion covers an area of 55 km sq and has a population of about 95,650, which is expected to rise to 100,000 by 2031.

European settlers found the banks of this river inviting and in 1838, just two years after the colony was founded, the village of Marion was laid out by Colonel William Light's team. By the 1930s, Marion's almond groves, market gardens and vineyards had earned it the title "the Garden of Adelaide".

Following the Second World War, population growth, new houses and businesses transformed the rural landscape and Marion was proclaimed a city in 1953.

Marion Shopping Centre opened in 1968 and by the 1970s the suburbs of Hallett Cove, Sheidow Park and Trott Park were expanding in the south.

The 1980s and 1990s saw further growth and a move to higher density housing. Our modern city is now home to people from many cultures, with about 22 per cent of residents born overseas.

With landmarks including the Oaklands Wetland and Recreation Plaza, Warriparinga, the Tonsley Innovation District, Morphettville Racecourse and the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre, City of Marion is a destination in itself.

What does Council do?

The City of Marion is a local government area managed by the Council which comprises a Mayor and 12 Councillors who are elected to office. The Council sets the overall direction for the development of the city and manages an annual budget of about \$92 million. It decides how to allocate this budget to services and projects, including roads, footpaths, drainage, parks, libraries and neighbourhood centres. Council's revenue is predominantly provided by rates, which are paid by property owners. There are 68 councils in South Australia, and while they can largely decide which services to provide, some services, including planning, development and dog and cat management are mandatory. The other tiers of government in Australia are Federal and State.

Council's role

- Council staff assess most development applications, whilst some may be assessed by private certifiers or the Marion Council Assessment Panel (independent experts appointed by Council)
- restricted or major developments will be assessed by the State Government
- Council also has a role in assessing building applications, undertaking inspections and compliance.

Elections

In South Australia, whole of state council elections (called periodic elections) are held every four years. The most recent periodic council elections took place in November 2022. The next periodic council elections will take place in November 2026.

Free Kitchen Caddy

By collecting your food scraps in a kitchen caddy for recycling in your green organics bin, you are helping to reduce the amount of waste that goes to landfill, as well as the associated waste disposal costs to the community. So, this is great for both our environment and our economy.



All food scraps, cooked and raw, can be collected in your kitchen caddy and placed into the green organics bin along with your garden clippings. Every household is entitled to one free kitchen caddy and each financial year, households can collect 150 (two rolls of 75) compostable bags.

Recycling electrical waste (E-waste)

E-waste is any electrical or electronic item that used a power plug or battery to run. All e-waste items contain heavy metals and are banned from landfill. This includes entertainment equipment, home appliances, electronic devices and power tools. For safe disposal you must either include the appliances in your hard rubbish booking (TVs and computers excluded) or take your e-waste to an e-waste drop off location near you for recycling.

Free hard waste collection

Fach household can book two free hard rubbish collections of up to one cubic metre of material per financial year, which you can now book online via the My Marion customer portal. Hard waste can include white goods such as fridges and washing machines, electrical household appliances, furniture, bed frames, and mattreses. It is illegal to put hard waste on the verge without booking a collection. For more info visit:



Registration for your furry friends

All dogs three months or older must be registered with the City of Marion within 14 days of ownership. It is important to register your dog each year so if it becomes lost, we can contact you to reunite you with your pet.

If you have moved to the City of Marion from another council area you are required to transfer your registration within 14 days. Dogs must be re-registered by 31 August each year.

Cats

Cats must be de-sexed and microchipped. To reduce the likelihood of cats causing a nuisance or harming native wildlife, we encourage owners to keep them indoors at night.

Barking dogs

Dogs can create an annoyance or nuisance to nearby neighbours by barking. When this situation occurs, it is primarily a dispute between two individuals and may be resolved by having a conversation with the owner of the barking dog to make them aware of the issue.



Home is where your cat is

In August 2022, we introduced seven by-laws. These by-laws outline the local government land, permits and penalties and rules around moveable signs, dogs, animal management, roads and cats. Most of these by-laws are already in effect, and by 1 January 2023, by-law 6 and by-law 7 will be fully implemented. The following 'needto-know' guides, highlight some changes that might affect you.

By-law 6 Cat Curfew

Residents told us we should create a new cat by-law. From 1 January 2023, you will be responsible for keeping your cat at your premises between 8pm and 7am. This



By-law 7 Roosters and Peacocks

Council permission will be required to keep, or permit to be kept, a prescribed animal on any premises. This is to prevent nuisance issues within the City of Marion.

Artificial turf on verges prohibited

Natural landscaping on verges creates a healthier environment for everyone. It allows for rainwater to be absorbed into the soil, provides habitat for birds and insects, reduces soil erosion and makes our streets better spaces to walk and cycle. The use of artificial turf on verges has negative impacts on the environment. For this reason, its use on verges has been prohibited by Council.

A Verge Incentive Fund is being trialled, providing a rebate to encourage more residents to beautify the verge area.

Developing your property? Plan SA – applications portal

All planning and development matters fall under the State Government's planning system, **PlanSA**. This means housing density is essentially decided under state law.

If you intend to carry out any form of development, you must lodge a development application with PlanSA, and receive development approval - which is made up of planning consent and building consent (and land division consent if applicable). Once consents are granted, council is then able to issue a development approval.
