
Environment Report Card 2022

Highlights from 2022 include:



4,759

trees planted across the council



15,000

native seedlings planted to improve habitat for wildlife

in rebates provided to support big trees and greening verges

Trees and planting

Ascot Park, Glengowrie, Plympton Park, O'Halloran Hill, and Warradale were the focus of our planting efforts

325 trees were planted along Lonsdale Highway, with funding provided by **Green Adelaide**, to improve an area identified as low canopy

206 trees were planted as part of **Greening Edwardstown Stage Two**

\$13,000 of **Regulated Tree** funding provided to assist residents to maintain big trees on their property

How much was collected in 2021/22?



Closing the loop

4.7 million plastic bags, 2,835 tonnes of recycled asphalt pavement, and toner from 137,800 printer cartridges diverted from landfill in 2021/22 through the use of Downer's Reconophalt in our road resealing program.



Waste audit results

households disposing of food waste to green bin (up from 5% pre-rollout)

16%

decrease in volume of food waste to landfill (from 35% to 19%)

The kitchen caddy rollout

1,144 tonnes of food waste from landfill diverted

\$162,334 in landfill disposal costs saved **2,174** tonnes (CO2e) of greenhouse gas emissions **cut**

An average of **58%** of resources were **diverted from landfill** by placing them in either the yellow or green bins

Contamination in the yellow bins has dropped to 12% which is below the metropolitan average of 13%

CoastSnap

A citizen science photo monitoring initiative to measure shoreline changes and beach erosion

5 CoastSnap stations installed across Hallett Cove and Marino

183 photos recorded by the community
